



FIRST READING

Psalm 19

The teaching of the LORD revives the soul.

The heavens are telling the glory of God,

and the firmament proclaims his handiwork.

²Day to day pours forth speech,

SECOND READING

1 Corinthians 12:12-31a

The apostle and pastor Paul uses the metaphor of the human body to describe how intimately connected we are in the church. For this struggling congregation in Corinth, Paul delivers a vital message of unity that is a mark of the church today.

¹² For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³ For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit.

¹⁴ Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. ¹⁵ If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. ¹⁶ And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. 17 If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? 18 But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. ¹⁹ If all were a single member, where would the body be? ²⁰ As it is, there are many members yet one body. ²¹ The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." ²² On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, ²³ and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect, ²⁴ whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, ²⁵ that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. ²⁶ If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it.


²⁷ Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. ²⁸ And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers, then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. ²⁹ Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work powerful deeds? ³⁰ Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? ³¹ But strive for the greater gifts. And I will show you a still more

excellent way.

Luke 4:14-21

Near the beginning of Jesus' public ministry, he visits his hometown of Nazareth. In the words of Isaiah, he states and claims his identity, purpose, and mission.

¹⁴ Then Jesus, in the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding region. ¹⁵ He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone. When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the Sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, ¹⁷ and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written: ¹⁸ "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,

because he has anointed me

to bring good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind,

to set free those who are oppressed,

¹⁹ to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

²⁰ And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. ²¹ Then he began to say to them, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing."

*Worship Notes: Florence Price – whose Adoration was heard as last Sunday's Offertory – was born in 1887, in Little Rock, Arkansas (Faith's music director's hometown). Price's mother, a music teacher and real estate agent, supported her daughter's musical interests, leading eventually to studies in organ performance, piano pedagogy, and composition; Price graduated from the New England Conservatory in 1906.

A career as a composer, performer, teacher and administrator followed, in addition to Price's roles as wife and mother. She was active in the classical music community of Chicago's South Side; a member of the National Association of Negro Musicians, she was also a member of the Musicians Club of Women and the Chicago Club of Women Organists. Legendary vocalist Marian Anderson was a frequent collaborator with Florence Price, programming and recording the composer's art songs and concert spirituals.

Allen Pote was born in 1945 in Kansas; he graduated from Texas Christian University with a degree in Church Music. As a Fulbright Scholar he studied in Belgium; he also studied at Union Theological Seminary in New York City. For more than two decades he served as Director of Music in churches in Texas and Florida, and currently lives in Pensacola, Florida, working as a full-time composer as well as co-directing, with his wife, Susan, the nationally known Pensacola Children's Choir of more than two-hundred singers.

Praised for the depth, wit, and humor of her performances (Seattle Times), Tamara Friedman attended the Oberlin Conservatory and received her master's degree from the Mannes College of Music (NYC), studying with Lilian Kallir.

She has collaborated with such artists as Stanley Ritchie, Jaap Schroder, Max van Egmond, and Tanya Tomkins, and has been appearing with violinist Elizabeth Blumenstock as Duo Amadeus for the last several decades.

In the Pacific Northwest, Tamara has performed on the Seattle Camerata, Allegro Baroque and Beyond, Belle Arte, Early Music Guild, Gallery Concerts, and Mostly Nordic series and for the Governor's Chamber Music Festival.

She has been the featured performer in early piano workshops for Pacific Lutheran University (Tacoma, WA) and the Western Early Keyboard Association, and has lectured on Mozart for several regional and statewide music teacher associations in the Pacific Northwest.

Tamara is co-curator of the Skagit Early Keyboard Museum, where, together with George Bozarth, she welcomes performers, teachers, groups of students, and others interested in historic pianos. In the summers Tamara has been featured on the Kennebec Early Music Festival in Bath, Maine.

CARING CONVERSATIONS

- Jesus came to set us free. From what would you like Jesus to set you free?

DEVOTIONS



This is Jesus' first sermon in Luke. That makes it a particularly important message, one that

slaves and prisoners would be freed, debts would be forgiven, and lands lost to debts would be is clear. Jesus has God's Spirit to encourage the poor, free captives, give sight to the blind, and eveals recurring themes in Jesus' ministry. Jesus chooses to read from Isaiah 61. The message (v.19), a phrase that represents the year of jubilee announced in Leviticus 25. Every fifty years some and perpetual poverty for others. Jesus brings all sorts of new beginnings for powerless people. Jesus would be one of the powerless and die on a cross as a criminal. His life, death, and resurrection become the good news for a world where unfairness and abuse of powers returned to ancestral owners. This keeps society from unraveling into unlimited wealth for set free those who are burdened. Finally, he is to announce the "*year of the Lord's favor*" seem to win the day, but never really will in God's rule.

Discuss: Where is there a need in today's world for Jesus' freeing power?

Pray: Almighty and merciful God, we thank you for freeing us to serve you with thanksgiving and serve our neighbor in love, through Christ Jesus who preaches good news for all. Amen.
